2 Samuel "King David's Reign"

Background Information

Originally the second part of one book of Samuel, 2 Samuel was made a single division clearly because it is dominated by one figure: David.

As with 1 Samuel, we do not know the human author, but Samuel, Nathan, and Gad are possible writers.

2 Samuel 7 is a key chapter, because in it, God gives to David a clear picture of His plan to bring about a king from his line (see also 1 Kings 2:4; 1 Chronicles 22:8-10; 2 Chronicles 7:17-18)

Time Covered and Outline

The rise and reign of David provide almost all the material for the book, which covers about 40 years.

Four Well-Known Accounts from 2 Samuel The ark comes to Jerusalem (6) David and Bathsheba (11) The mighty men (23) David numbers the people (24)

[&]quot;Therefore you are great, O Lord God. For there is none like you, and there is no God besides you, according to all that we have heard with our ears. And who is like your people Israel, the one nation on earth whom God went to redeem to be His people, making himself a name and doing for them great and awesome things by driving out before your people, whom you redeemed for yourself from Egypt, a nation and its gods?"

David's royal line leads to Jesus. The promise given in 2 Samuel 7:12-16 also promises the coming Messiah. David's life is also a type of Christ as shepherd-king.

Ark (Hebrew *aron);* 6:2; 6:4; 6:10; 6:12; 6:17; 7:2; 11:11; 15:24 Jerusalem; related to the word for "peace." Mighty men (Hebrew *gibbor);* 1:25; 10:7; 16:6; 17:8; 20:7; 23:8; 23:22

The Ayran empire expands all the way to the Ganges Valley in India. Large construction projects expand the city of Nineveh.

Elsewhere in Scripture...

- 1. Much of 2 Samuel is also recorded in 1 Chronicles, starting mainly with the beginning of David's reign in 2 Samuel 5 and 1 Chronicles 11. From that point on, there is a great deal of both supplementary material and explanation.
- 2. Since David wrote many of the Psalms, a large number fall into the time frame of 2 Samuel, as do those written by Korah and Asaph.
